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[Hattie effect size list - VISIBLE LEARNING](#)

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John Hattie developed a way of synthesizing various influences in different meta-analyses according to their effect size (Cohen's d). In his ground-breaking study "Visible Learning" he ranked 138 influences that are related to learning outcomes from very positive effects to very negative effects. Hattie found that the average effect size of all the interventions he studied was 0.40.

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Example Sentences. Differentiated Instruction and UDL share the same goal: to maximize learning opportunities for all students. The distinction between the two frameworks lies within the goal; DI focuses on differentiating with a focus at the student level, whereas UDL focuses on designing flexible curricula with the needs of the broadest range of students in mind from the start.
