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Letting the deaf Be Deaf Reconsidering the Use of Cochlear Implants in Prelingually Deaf Children by Robert A. Crouch In theory, cochlear implants hold out the possibility of enabling profoundly prelingually deaf children to hear. For these children's parents, who are usually hearing, this possibility is a great relief.

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Purpose: This study documents child, family and educational characteristics of a large representative sample of 8- to 9-yr-old prelingually deaf children who received a cochlear implant by 5 yr of age.

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Cochlear implantation is a major event in the life of a deaf child and it is likely to have a significant impact on his or her cognitive and social development.
